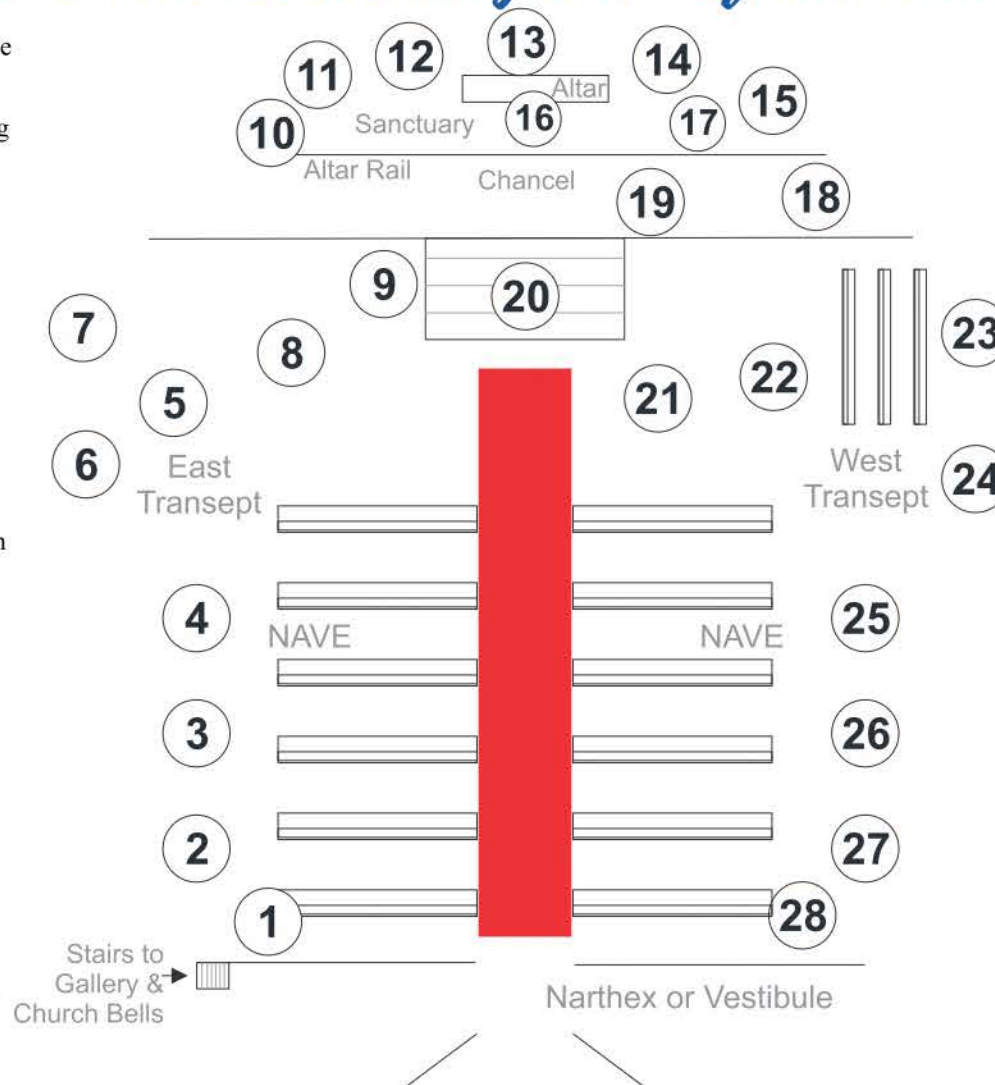


A Clockwise Walking Tour Of The Church

1. A.J. Casson calligraphy WWI memorial list. Casson was one of the famous Group of Seven.
2. War Memorial Window (1946). Jesus is receiving a kneeling knight, symbolizing all who served in the Armed Forces. St. George is on the left, and St. Paul on the right.
3. Light of the World Window (1976). Jesus is standing at the door of our hearts knocking (Rev. 3:20). Given by the Charnock family.
4. Dorcas Window (1942). Dorcas (Tabitha) was a giving woman, raised from the dead by Peter (Acts 9). Given by the Women's Auxiliary.
5. New Chapel, dedicated on Nov. 2, 2008. The olive wood cross was hand made in Bethlehem.
6. Baptismal Window (1942). Note the Jewish Star of David in the bottom left.
7. Holy Communion Window (1942).
8. Pulpit. Traditionally where sermons are preached although most preachers today preach from the main aisle.
9. Rood Screen (1933). Separates the nave from the chancel. Note the cross on the top. Rood means 'cross.'
10. Bishop's Chair. Special seat for the Bishop.
11. Nativity Window (1935)
12. Calling of the Disciples (1923).
13. Sermon on the Mount Window (1908). Oldest stained glass window.
14. Crucifixion Window (1937).
15. Ascension Window (1931).
16. Sanctuary Light (hanging from ceiling). This light is always burning, and is a reminder of the presence of Jesus.



17. Look for these symbols in the sanctuary ceiling:
 Winged man ~ symbolizes the writer of the Gospel of Matthew
 Winged lion ~ symbolizes Mark
 Ox ~ represents Luke
 Eagle ~ sign of John
 Chi Rho ~ 1st 2 letters of Christ
 IHS ~ 1st 3 letters of Jesus
 Sheaf of Wheat ~ bread of life
 Grapes ~ Symbol of eucharistic wine
18. Pipe Organ (1908). Manufactured by Karn in Woodstock, ON. Re-built after a Dec. 27, 1932 church fire. The organ has 1000 working pipes.
19. Rector's Stall. Used by all 14 Rectors of St. Paul's.
20. Chancel Steps. Thousands of couples have been married at these steps.
21. Baptismal Font. Note the inscription on the font. The Old English word 'suffer' means 'let.'
22. Lectern. From the Latin 'to read.' Scripture is read from here on Sunday mornings.
23. Jesus with a Woman (representing Faith) Window (1948).
24. St. Peter and St. Paul Window (1961). Designed by Yvonne Williams, famous for her colourful and contemporary designs. The life of the Apostle Paul is on the left and Peter on the right. Given by the Killick family.
25. Easter Morning Window (1948). Christ is risen!
26. Conversion of St. Paul Window (1947). Paul encountered the risen Christ on the road to Damascus.

The Church Bells (1924)



You may go up to the gallery (stairs in narthex) to get a birds-eye view of the church interior and to try playing the church bells.

Made in New York. Given by Dr. Hamilton.
 The 10 bells, weighing 7200 lbs., are manually operated by pressing handles.
 The bells don't swing; Clappers strike each bell in turn.
